3 - point English Computerized Exam

(up to & including the A2 Level)

Introduction:

The following rubrics and guidelines will be used to assess basic oral reception and production skills (up to and including the A2 Level) of students taking the three-point exam. The Criteria table provides more specific guidelines for grading purposes and to further clarify definitions for each sub-category.

<u>Rubrics & Guidelines for Marking Oral Production in Open Questions:</u> Parts C ("Talking About Yourself") and D ("Picture Story")

Markers will mark TWO open questions. In Part C, the students are given two topics and must answer <u>one</u> of them (question 11 <u>or</u> question 12). In Part D, the students are required to describe a picture story (question 13). Markers, therefore, will be marking either questions 11 & 13 or questions 12 & 13. For each of these two questions, markers will give two marks; one mark for Task Coverage (TC) and the other for Language Use (LU).

All marks are out of 100. Markers will calculate the mark out of 100 by multiplying the given mark by 10.

No in-between marks such as 78% will be given.

Guidelines for Task Coverage (TC):

The mark for Task Coverage reflects the student's performance with regard to <u>content</u>; completion of the required tasks, relevance to the task or topic as well as the delivery; namely, intelligibility of speech and fluency.

When giving a mark for Task Coverage, most of the focus/weight will be on completion of the tasks and topic relevance with less given for the delivery unless it impedes upon our understanding.

Task Coverage comprises 85% of the final grade for each answer.

- Students must complete <u>all of the tasks</u> in order to receive full points for Task Coverage.
- The mark for Task Coverage should reflect the student's performance with regard to completion of the required tasks. For example, if a student answers 50% of the task in Parts C and D (one out of the two sub questions in Part C or describes only half of the picture story in Part D), the total mark for Task Coverage will not exceed 5 out of 10. In such cases, the mark for Language Use will be given on merit and no extra deduction will be made.
- In Part C, the student is required to answer both sub-questions. The student does not have to give the same amount of time, details or depth to each part.
- In Part C, the student is instructed to answer the entire task (both sub-questions) in at least 20 seconds. If the student's answer is shorter than the 20-second requirement, deduct only if it affects the Completion of Tasks or Topic Relevance. If the student fails to complete the requirements of the task because his answers are under 20 seconds, deduct from Topic Coverage according to severity. In such cases, the mark given to Language Use may also reflect this lack of production.
- In Part C, if the student answers BOTH questions 11 and 12 in his/her one answer, mark on merit and do not deduct for the extra answer.
- In Part D, there is no requirement for length. However, the student is required to relate to each of the pictures. Accept if the student tells the full story without referring explicitly to each picture. The student does not have to give each picture the same attention. He can talk about one in more depth than others.
- In Part D, accept different or varied interpretations of the picture story as long as they are logical.

Guidelines for Language Use (LU):

The mark for Language Use reflects the students' performance with regard to Language and Vocabulary up to and including the A2 level.

Language Use comprises 15% of the final grade for each answer.

- Students should not be penalized for mistakes made in language and vocabulary above the A2 level.
- Students who use language and vocabulary <u>above</u> the required A2 level correctly, should be given credit.
- Consistently poor use of language and vocabulary which impedes upon the understanding of the answer will affect the students' mark in Task Coverage as well.

General Guidelines:

- When deliberating between two marks, give the higher one.
- Do not give "in-between" marks such as 55 or 78.
- If the student uses a language other than English for religious holidays, national celebrations or culturally bound phrases, do not deduct.
- Use of languages other than English will lead to a deduction from <u>BOTH TC and LU</u> depending on severity.
- A score of 0 should be given only in the following cases:
 - when an answer is completely incomprehensible or gibberish
 - when the entire answer is in a language other than English.
 - when the student uses foul language and curse words
 - when the file is empty (no sound or production can be heard)

Clarification regarding CHEATING and READING FROM AN OUTSIDE SOURCE:

- GIVING "CHASHAD" FOR SUSPECTED CHEATING:
 - 1. If the student receives assistance in the form of someone clearly whispering answers to him, give a mark and fill in a chashad.
 - 2. If the marker hears pages turning, a mark and a chashad will be given. (Please be sure that the source of this noise isn't the microphone, a candy wrapper or the proctor reading the newspaper.)
 - 3. If the student gives an answer in Part C ("Talking About Yourself") or D ("Picture Story") according to the other version, give a chashad. In Part C, if the student has completed the first part ("Tell me a few things about yourself") which is common to both questions, then partial marks will be given (see the above guidelines). In Part D, the student will get a zero for describing a different story.
 - 4. If students give identical answers (word for word) to Part D ("Picture Story"), give a mark and a chashad.
 - 5. When you can tell that the student is reading his/her answer from an outside source (due to serious mispronunciation and/or speech that is fragmented and unnatural), give a mark and fill in a chashad. Please note:
 - o In parts C and D, the students are given written information (that they can see on the screen) which includes instructions, the topic itself and sometimes "useful vocabulary". For example, in the Pizza Story, the students were told that "You may use the following words in your answer: dough, recipe." If the student uses this information in his answer, he/she is obviously reading from the screen. In such cases, do not relate to it as "reading his/her answer".
 - The topics and questions for part C, "Talking About Yourself", can be found on the "Stay Up To Date" site.
 Teachers can prepare their students and students can prepare their answers beforehand. Please take this into account and do not automatically consider that the students are reading their answers since they may have learnt them by heart.
