reading fluency and accuracy

reading comprehension

all as in wall, tall, call, fall



Some Examples of Pre-Reading Activities

- Review orthographic patterns: all + ou
- Pre-teach new vocabulary: flashcards / quizlet / memory games
- Practice new vocabulary: multi-choice / yes, no / fill in the missing letter or word
- Pre-reading activities: circle all the names
 / underline all the animals / which words
 appear 5+ times / colour pairs of rhyming
 words
- Let's guess what the script will be about!!

Training for Young Actors: Brain Breaks





agree to pretend



cooperation and respect



concentrate



use gestures (There was too much noise! / There is help on the way!



use sound effects (mooing, chirping, clapping, singing, fighting)

And finally, to the script!



Teacher reads text aloud with LOTS OF EXPRESSION OR plays an audio clip of the text being read aloud on the LT site



Assess comprehension



Offer students choice of roles



Students highlight their lines



Practice reading silently, then in pairs. Teacher walks around checking and listening out for accuracy and correct intonation.



Read the script together!

FAQ's



Do the pupils need to memorize their lines?



Can they make or use props?



Can my pupils dress up in costumes?



What should I do with the pupils who can't read yet?



What should I do if the script I like only has a few reading parts?

Assessment! Really?

Students are evaluated based on:

volume of voice

clarity of pronunciation

reading accuracy

expression

reading fluency

posture

eye contact

What Kind of Assessment?

Self-Assessment

Pupils should ask themselves questions about their performance and write tips for improvement the next time around.



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Peer-Assessment

Pupils can create a peer-assessment template and use it to assess each other so that they can formulate constructive feedback for their classmates.

This activity not only helps others, but helps those doing the assessment too!



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Teacher-Assessment

The teacher can use this activity as a form of alternative assessment, formative assessment or summative assessment, depending on her objectives.
